Revising and Updating the Core Competencies for Public Health Professionals

In the six years since the Competencies were adopted, the field of public health has seen major changes, from the events of September 11, 2001 to new technologies, and an aging workforce. With new funding, the Council is undertaking a project to revise and update the Competencies, based on recommendations from Council members, as well as the public.

Mapping the Public Health Workforce Pipeline

In an attempt to strengthen the public health workforce, both in numbers and in quality, the Council will work to map the pipeline for public health professionals, charting how, when, and where people enter and leave governmental public health agencies. The pipeline map should shed light on issues of recruitment and retention of public health workers.
